We're pleased to include an article from a Freeport-area vet in the Friends Forever newsletter! Authors will change from issue to issue and will focus on a seasonal or other timely pet concern. Thank you, veterinarians!

Ho Ho Ho! It's the holidays – time for treats for EVERYONE!

For many folks, their idea of a "special treat" for their pet is to give them people food. After all, if chocolate-covered pretzels or frosted cookies are *your* favorite, sharing some at the holidays would be fine for your pet too, right?

Wrong.

Not that your pet probably wouldn't relish every bite, but people food is best enjoyed by people. Instead, treat your pet to pet-specific treats. Why? Here are four good reasons.

1 Once a moocher, always a moocher.

Our pets are smart – once they get you to part with a few choice morsels from your plate, they'll never stop begging. That behavior can range from giving you the sad eyes that are nearly impossible to refuse to whining or jumping up or worse. While that might not trouble you much, your dinner guests or other family members might not feel the same.

2 Table scraps don't generally provide sound nutrition for your pet.

The more you fill your pets with your food, the less likely they are to eat their own, which hopefully is a good, quality food with all of the vitamins and minerals they need. People food is also one of the leading causes of pet digestive disorders from gas to bad breath and much more "unpleasant" problems. If you have questions about the nutritional value of the food you're using, just ask your vet. We've included two great pet treat recipes at the end of this article if you want to show them a little extra love!

3People foods are the fast lane to weight problems for pets.

Most leftovers are just empty calories. Why do we often save the fat we trim off



our own meat to give to our four-legged friends? We know it's not good for us, so how could it be good for them? If you must share something from your plate, offer a bite of lean meat or a veggie or two. In addition to altering their trim good looks, overweight pets have a higher risk of many health problems. As a rule, treats should never account for more than 10% of your pet's food intake.

Once they've tried people food, they might try almost anything to get it.

One way your pets can convince to give them more of your food is to turn into finicky eaters. You'll end up thinking that they're going to go hungry if you don't give them hamburger every night. If you don't "hand over the goods," you could also create a food thief who knocks over the trash, jumps on the counters, or scours your kitchen wastebasket for what they think is rightfully theirs! Treats don't usually encourage bad behavior – in fact, many people use treats to reward positive behavior.

Treats developed especially for pets not only provide more animal-friendly nutrition but can also be used for specific purposes, like teeth-cleaning or filling the urge/need to chew. A far better choice when you want to do something special for your four-legged family members at the holidays, they can be just as satisfying to your pet, especially when handed out with all the flourish of a filet mignon in your tone of voice and belly rubs afterward. It's all in the presentation!

Turkey and Cranberry **Dog Bones**

Allrecipes.com

Prep Time: 20 Minutes Cook Time: 55 Minutes Servings: 45 biscuits

- 3 1/2 cups whole wheat flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 cup shredded cooked turkey
- 1 cup dried cranberries

1 egg

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 cup low-sodium chicken broth, or as needed

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Lightly grease baking sheets,
- 2. In a large bowl, whisk the whole wheat flour and baking powder together until
 - thoroughly combined, and stir in the cooked turkey meat and dried cranberries. Make a well in the center of the flour mixture, and drop the egg into the center; pour in the olive oil and about 1/2 cup of chicken broth. Mix into a soft dough. If mixture is too dry, mix in more chicken broth, about 1 tablespoon at a time,

until dough is of desired consistency. 3. Turn the dough out onto a floured work surface,

- and knead for 1 to 2 minutes. Roll the dough out 1/4 inch thick, and cut out with your favorite cookie cutters.
- 4. Bake until the treats turn brown, about 25 minutes. Turn the oven off, and leave the dog treats in the oven an additional 30 minutes to dry out. Refrigerate leftover dog treats.

3 oz sausage or finely ground beef 2 T oatmeal 1 egg Catnip, finely chopped

Directions

Knead the ingredients together very thoroughly and form into a flat oval. Broil under a medium heat for 5-7 minutes, turning frequently, until the outside is crisp. Wait until cool, then slice into bite-sized chunks for your cat.

Manager's Letter

The Paths That Bring Our Animals To Us

As many of us head "over the river and through the woods" to Grandmother's house or to visit other relatives this holiday season, I thought I'd answer a question I often hear: where do the animals at Friends Forever come from? animal control facilities and veterinary clinics because their "time is up" due to lack of space or the amount of holding time the facility is able to keep them. Some have manageable behavior issues that we at FFHS can address through

There are a number of ways animals land at Friends Forever to await their forever homes. The first is as a stray, either brought by a city's animal control organization or someone who finds the animal and brings it to us. Some of these strays are reclaimed by their owners, and some are not. After being held for a certain period of time (which can vary, based on the circumstances through which the animal

came to us in the first place), the animal becomes available for adoption through our facility.

Sometimes pets' owners will bring them to us and surrender them to our care. There are many reasons that people may find themselves unable to care for their pets, and we are glad that they bring them to us rather than choosing some other less desirable option.

A variation on this occurs when someone adopts a pet from FFHS and then returns the pet. This also can happen for many reasons, from life-changing experiences that weren't anticipated – such as moving, a death, a health problem, or other similar situations – to a mismatch between the pet and the family. Obviously, we try very hard to ensure that mismatches don't happen, but we're not infallible.

Some animals are transferred in from



training. FFHS is often the last chance for these animals.

The last way animals come to us is through the Circle of Hope, which is a network of shelters working together. Area shelters send us animals that have been overlooked for a length of time at their facility, because sometimes all that's needed is a new location to bring in a new group of potential adopters.

However they come to us, we work hard to find these worthy pets a forever home. As you celebrate with your friends and family this holiday season, I hope you'll take a moment to consider a donation to help us provide excellent care for them, take an ongoing step to become a Friends Forever BFF, or contemplate a New Year's resolution to bring a furry friend into your life in 2015.
